Over the last two years, The Institute has taken significant steps toward building our future and the future we want for America's workers. In 2019, we celebrated the historic passage of the Forced Arbitration Injustice Repeal (FAIR) Act by the U.S. House of Representatives, while expanding our collection of educational resources on forced arbitration. We introduced an *Amicus* Program to have an even greater influence on the development of employment law. And, in response to the growth of the gig economy and the alarming trends emerging for gig workers, The Institute in 2020 launched a new area of focus: Exploitation In The Gig Economy.

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In Review

Reinforcing Our Foundation

As the charitable public interest partner of the National Employment Lawyers Association (NELA), The Institute collaborates with the country's leading workers' rights attorneys to understand the challenges individuals face every day at work and the obstacles they must overcome in seeking justice when they are mistreated. Workers deserve a strong and powerful voice, and with NELA, The Institute has made it a priority to amplify that voice.

This commitment is inspired by our highest values, which are reflected in the shared vision The Institute and NELA adopted in November 2019:

We aspire to a future in which all workers are treated with dignity and respect; workplaces are equitable, diverse, and inclusive; and the well-being of workers is a priority in business practices.

The Institute also clarified its unique role in realizing this bold vision by updating its mission:

The Institute's mission is to advance workers' rights through research, thought leadership, and education for policymakers, advocates, and the public.

Expanding Our Work

For more than a decade, The Institute has been a leader in the fight against forced arbitration in the workplace. We are known for our growing portfolio of online resources on the subject. In 2019, we published Justice Denied: How The U.S. Supreme Court Forced America's Workers Into Arbitration, an interactive timeline which allows readers to explore six aspects of forced arbitration through a thorough review of the case law.

We expanded *The Facts On Forced*Arbitration, a toolkit explaining how forced arbitration allows certain types of behavior to persist in the workplace, including the silencing of sexually harassed workers, rampant wage theft, and discrimination.

Through our new *Amicus* Program launched in 2019, The Institute has submitted or signed onto eight *amicus* curiae briefs in high-impact employment cases before the U.S. Supreme Court and Courts of Appeals.

In 2020, The Institute released our first two research projects focused on exposing the inequities within the gig economy. "The Gig Economy By The Numbers" and "Spotlight On California: AB 5, Proposition 22, And The Fight For Gig Workers' Rights" provide important background information and highlight current attempts by employers to deny gig workers vital workplace protections.

Cultivating Advocates

The Paul H. Tobias (PHT) Attorney Fellowship Program, named in honor of NELA's Founder and first Executive Director, exemplifies our commitment to cultivating the next generation of workers' rights lawyers and experts. It provides a new lawyer with the opportunity to work at The Institute for two years. Christy England, a 2019 graduate of UCLA School of Law, joined us in November 2019 as the 2019-2021 PHT Attorney Fellow. She succeeded Elizabeth Colman, who joined The Institute as the 2016-2018 PHT Attorney Fellow. At the conclusion of her initial fellowship, Elizabeth accepted a new one-year position as Senior PHT Attorney Fellow & Policy Advocate. We thank Elizabeth for an outstanding tenure and wish her well in her future endeavors.

Through The Employee Rights Advocacy Scholarship Program, The Institute broadens access to NELA's CLE programs, which are designed specifically by and for attorneys who represent workers within a highly supportive professional network. In 2019 and 2020, The Institute provided scholarships to a geographically diverse group of 26 workers' rights advocates. Scholarship recipients included public interest and legal services attorneys, law students who are deeply committed to practicing plaintiffs' employment law, and attorneys in private practice without the financial resources to receive NELA's specialized training.
